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One day – many actions – worldwide

To work the earth and to take care of it (Gen. 2:15), to shape the world and to enhance life at the same time: This Christian duty corresponds to the model of sustainable development.

Climate change has severe impacts on people and nature in many parts of the world. Droughts and floods destroy fields and harvests, diseases are spreading. We need to take strong action on climate protection to minimise the impacts of a changing climate and to save God's creation.

With the campaign "Mission: Save the climate! Powered by heaven" of the Evangelical Church of Westphalia (EKvW) and the United Evangelical Mission we want to support and motivate young people to work for protection of climate and environment – in their personal setting, parish, local community and in society. Aim of the campaign is to provide young people with the experience that everybody can contribute to meet the challenge of climate change. Numerous actions have already been carried out, e.g. an international climate camp, workshops, an exhibition etc.

To strengthen each other mutually in the commitment for integrity of creation and climate justice we want to combine this dedication with activities of other UEM member churches and partner churches of the EKvW. In order to give young people the opportunity to experience that everywhere in the world young people and adults stand up for integrity of creation and climate justice, the first international Youth Action Day for climate justice was set up by the campaign "Mission: Save the climate! Powered by heaven" together with the youth-campaign "Hot Times".

The idea of this action is to activate young people in many places of the world to organise and carry out at

the same time activities on climate and environmental protection. Via media – such as Facebook, Skype etc. – these actions are communicated to the other participating groups in order to get a common feeling of being a member of a worldwide movement. The primary aim is to raise awareness among young people for climate protection as a common challenge and task (for which mainly the industrialised countries bear responsibility) and to make them experience differentiated responsibility, solidarity, but as well to sensitize public for climate justice.

Every year at the beginning of December the UN Climate Change Conference takes place. This is when the Youth Action Day for Climate Justice takes place. At the first action day on December 8th, 2012, young people from different continents showed that they care for protection of climate and environment. They started activities and projects like promoting renewable energy, saving energy, planting trees, climate concerts. They presented their activities on Facebook, chatted via Skype and thereby met like-minded young people from other UEM-member churches. What they did and how it was received, is presented in this brochure.

The success of this day made clear that the Climate Action Day could not be a singular event. That is why on December 7th, 2013 the second Action Day will take place – for environmental and climate protection.

Writing contest, radio interviews and exposition on solar energy – EEC (Evangelical Church of Cameroon)

Activities:

- Conference in a high school in Douala on climate change, followed by a practical demonstration on solar energy;
- Radio talk on one of the most well-known radio station, Radio Nostalgie by Felix Nkam and Hermann Ntimame, with listeners calling for a question and answer session;
- Conference at the Foyer de Jeunesse for youth in Douala, followed by a music concert on the theme of environment.
- Poem/essay contest in 16 highschools on the preservation of our environment. Copies of candidates were forwarded to Douala, where a jury of three examiners marked them. Prizes were awarded to the best candidates.

What a weekend!! The events were really successful and people enjoyed them.

At the Collège Evangélique de New Bell two groups of more than 80 young students each attended the presentation on solar energy on Friday between 12 am and 2 pm and appreciated what they learned and saw.

The demonstration was made indoors and outdoors. It was also visited by the college principal who thanked UEM for the event.

At Radio Nostalgie on Saturday morning, Felix Nkam and Hermann Ntimamo had two hours on Saturday morning from 8 to 10 am to talk extensively about UEM, its actions and the main event. It was also important to them to explain how our behaviour affects our climate. Many questions from listeners during the presentation showed that people were in need of precise answers concerning climate change. We know that people got the message.

At the Foyer de Jeunesse, in the afternoon, the main focus of the conference was on climate change too and a concert followed. Three dynamic youth choirs performed for two hours in front of a cheering crowd of more than 100 people.

81 youths from 54 parishes of Anglican Church of Rwanda gathered from 6th-8th of December. Climate concert “Wake Up”– The Youth of HKI (Indonesian Christian Church)


Activities:

Fighting against deforestation – the Youth of the GBKP (Karo Batak Protestant Church)

Activities:

- Tree planting

Due to climate change the recent weather was very uncertain. The impact of globalisation has caused many significant changes also in Indonesia. Industry is causing environmental damages which affect the survival of the surrounding community. Karo land, formerly known for its beauty and freshness, is affected, especially by deforestation. The forests need to be preserved from damages.

Perbulan is the name of the village where the young people planted trees around the church and also around offices of Lau Baleng District. Since 1992 the village has experienced several floods and landslides because it is the lowest area in that district. So whenever the rain comes, the houses are affected by floods and landslides. The government tries to stop it by planting trees. But due to increasing illegal logging, floods are getting more severe. The government carried out various seminars and workshops for the community to increase the awareness of the danger of illegal logging. Lau Baleng is situated in the Karo land, which is engaged in environmental preservation.

The youth group of GBKP planted trees in all congregations in Lau Baleng District on December 8th, 2012.

65 participants attended the activities from 19 churches of Lau Baleng District. They were supported by the agricultural department and the local government. Besides tree planting a workshop on “the importance of planting trees for the community” was given by the agricultural department.

We hope that by such activities the young people will increase their love and more become aware about their environment. And we hope that this program will bring positive impacts for our environmental preservation and climate protection in the future.

Interview with Yanti Sitepu

UEM Asian Regional Office (Medan, Indonesia)

Why should and must the youth be part of the commitment to climate justice?

Definitely, the youth must be part of the engagement for climate justice because the youth is the Agent of Change. Youth should be involved, then gradually they will finally understand their roles concerning climate justice.

In addition, young people usually have a community/group or network which is responsive, creative and they have a high motivation. So, when young people are educated about climate justice, the information they got might cause an expeditious alteration concerning their outlook on life, their family, the environment and the communities.

Why is it necessary that the churches will support this engagement?

The Church is entrusted with a mission. Church has a mission to be in charge of keeping God's creation. So climate justice is worth fighting for it. Normally the church congregations would keep up both vision and mission. For instance: The Karo Batak Protestant Church's theme in 2013 is "External Solidarity" (as a gesture of solidarity with human beings and the improvement of the natural environment). In connection with that, we launched the theme "External Solidarity" from the head office level until the grassroots level with small or large festivities. So, with the support of the churches the mission of climate justice continues to be pushed forward.

How was the Action Day perceived?

The 8th of December is an action day which becomes an attractive day. Youths of GBKP successfully run this programme, it's like providing the best competition of the world. GBKP youth is a singly youth organisation at the Karo church. We currently already have had an environmental programme every year at all levels with a variety of activities. And in 2012, we conducted the same actions as other groups. It was like an indirect support "for what I do, you try to do your best".



On the 8th of December 2012 in Perbulan Village (Lau Baleng District, Karoland) the youth of GBKP conducted a tree planting action seminary on forestry. The tree planting was held in the villages which are always affected by floods and landslides which is a permanent threat for the residents. That day, on Dec. 8th, it rained heavily and flooding occurred, but with 65 young people participating, it was an impassioned action. We planted fruit trees, avocado, durian, Suren and Terembesi trees, anti-fire trees around the local church and next to the head office of the district. Afterwards, each young person was given 5-10 trees, and they were supposed to bring them home and plant them around their respective churches.

The tree planting ran well according to the project, but it couldn't be transmitted via Skype, video call or Facebook, because of the landslides, floods and power outages which occurred in that village.

We were glad, since this action was very useful, especially for the village, local government and the youth. The youth mapped out a strategy to improve the communication with the government and it will be an ongoing programme to sharpen the attention of the youth for the environment.

What could be improved?

When an Action Day is planned the youth groups should establish the communication with other youth groups approximately one month before the action starts, whereby each group should have an individual partner from an other continent to increase the learning effect. The partners among each other should communicate intensively with one another via Facebook etc. By doing so they can learn a lot from each other.

1. Day for Climate Justice – Youth Church Dortmund, EKvW (Evangelical Church of Westphalia)

Activities:

- Live Music at the Youth Church and also “open mic” (everyone could join and present a song)
- Flee market to buy or change used items, e.g. as Christmas presents, instead of buying new things
- Market where different organisations could offer possibilities to get active in climate protection
- Booth where everyone could design his or her own jute bag (instead of using so many plastic bags)
- Vegetarian food and fair trade drinks
- Showing a movie with a self-built bicycle-cinema.
- The possibility to donate to “Viva con Agua”, an organisation with an emphasis on the funding and implementation of water projects all over the world to improve the access to clean water

Young people from the Youth Church of Dortmund and other young people living in that area joined the first UEM International Youth Action Day for Climate Justice, which was mainly organised in Dortmund by Carla Raul and Philipp Othmer who are both highly active within the Youth Church of Dortmund. The idea of their action was to offer a variety of actions in the Youth church to raise awareness for climate justice and to show up alternatives in consumer behaviour.

The number of participants reached approx. 50 young people. Just at the start of the event in Dortmund the young organisers had a Skype conference with the Indonesian activists who realised the “Climate Concert” and they were really impressed and happy to see that so many people joined the concert for Climate Justice.

2. Action against plastic bags – Youth Church Hamm, EKvW

Activities

- Selling jute bags to reduce waste

Young people from the Youth Church of Hamm and other young people living in that area also joined the first UEM International Youth Action Day for Climate Justice. Young people from the Evangelical Youth of Hamm participated in an international encounter with young people from Indonesia in the late summer 2012 which was organised by the United Evangelical Mission. After having taken part in the Youth campaign “Mission: Save the climate! Powered by heaven” and heartened by the international experiences and the exchange with the young people from Indonesia, the youth group in Hamm was highly motivated to join the International Action Day for Climate Justice.

The idea of their action on the 8th of December was to sell jute bags with their own designs in the city of Hamm to random customers who were doing their Christmas shopping and thereby raise awareness for the environmental pollution due to using too many plastic bags and too many plastic products in general. The action did not only take part on the 8th of December but lasted throughout the next three weeks until Christmas.



3. Climate friendly “Get together” – Youth Education Centre Nordwalde, EKvW

Activities:

- Bringing together all volunteers using only few resources

More than 100 people had a climate friendly “Get together” at the Youth Education Centre Nordwalde, one of three youth education centres of the Evangelical Church of Westphalia in a northern church district. Towards the end of each year the Evangelical Youth in Westphalia offers regional events to say “Thank you” to all the young people who volunteered throughout the year organising camps, workshops or seminars. In 2012 the Youth Education Centre Nordwalde organised a climate friendly party to join the first International Youth Action Day for Climate Justice.

At this eco-fair “Get together” in Nordwalde the more than 100 participants enjoyed regional (mainly) vegetarian food and regional drinks and had energy-saving technologies like LEDs for illumination or for playing music. The Youth Education Centre uses green electricity. Online on Facebook the participants could overlook the other activities that took place on the Action Day.



What can youth groups do?

There are a huge range of actions youth groups can take at the Action Day for Climate Justice, depending on your aim and the resources available to you. In the action kit for the day you will find more ideas and a detailed description.

Raise awareness about climate change

- Write an article for the school or local newspaper.
- Teach the public about the impacts of climate change and how different groups (women and men, rich and poor, young and old) are affected in different ways.
- Produce a poster, leaflet or video highlighting the problem you have identified.
- Run a workshop on climate change for other youth groups in your area.
- Arrange for speakers to come to your community to share their knowledge and skills.
- Celebrate worships on preserving creation and climate justice. Material: www.vemission.org/climatespirituality

Actions to reduce greenhouse gas emissions

- Plant trees or organise a tree-planting event.
- Make solar cookers.
- Organise a play for your local community, acting out the devastating effects of climate change and the actions individuals can take to reduce environmental damages.
- Plan a public event or a ‘media event’ that attracts attention to your action: invite local officials to a tree-planting; build a solar cooker in front of a public place and cook a local specialty.
- Buy products that have been made or grown locally rather than shipped or flown in from far away. Learn how to grow your own food and help others to learn it as well.
- Persuade family and community members to save energy at home.
- At school, work with other pupils and school leaders to develop and implement an energy-saving plan.



Actions to prepare for the impacts of climate change


- Learn about home water treatment technologies and safe storage of water at home. Demonstrate these techniques to your school or community.
- Measure and record water levels and water quality information in your community. Compare the information with records on the quantity of rainfall in the past. Find out what sustainable water supplies for domestic use have been set up for the present and the future.
- Set up a scheme to encourage boys and men in the community to help share the burden of domestic work such as fetching water.
- Map the community, identifying people and places that are vulnerable to natural disaster and discuss plans of action for an emergency.
- Record the ways that your community is coping with and adapting to the changing climate and share strategies within your community and beyond.

Persuade those with power to make a change

- Collect data and information to support your position and approach.
- Organise a petition to show public support for the change your group wants to make visible and present it to decision makers.
- Write a letter to, or meet with, a local elected representative.
- Develop alliances with other groups and organisations with similar goals and join together to put pressure on people in power.
- Broadcast radio messages calling for a new law on climate change.

Be an advocate: take any of these actions on behalf of someone else or another group who cannot get their voice heard.

It will be a great sign, if many youth groups join in the second Action Day. We can show that young people advocate climate justice and that we as Christian people act credibly.
